Dear Friends – Our hymn #598, Lord Christ, when first thou cam'st to earth, includes this verse:

New advent of the love of Christ, shall we again refuse thee, till in the night of hate and war, we perish as we lose thee? From old unfaith our souls release, to seek the kingdom of thy peace, by which alone we choose thee.

In what sense could we lose the new advent of the love of Christ? I think the Gospels give us a tremendous illustration: Where are the stories of Jesus from his infancy until his adult Baptism by John, his adult ministry, dying and rising? There is only one story in the Bible, of the twelve-year-old boy going with his parents to Jerusalem, then being left behind because he is busy talking with the elders in the synagogue. Some of the gospels that are not included in the Bible have fantastic or quaint stories of the growing boy, and legend says he traveled to England with Joseph of Arimathea.

Nevertheless, we go from Baby Jesus in the manger – Matthew's story of the Magi followed by the Family's escape to Egypt as Herod murdered all the boys under two years old – to Jesus' adulthood with an abrupt thud. What happened to

Be near me, Lord Jesus; I ask Thee to stay Close by me forever, and love me I pray Bless all the dear children in Thy tender care & take us to Heaven to live with Thee there

Our entire Biblical, Christian tradition has lost Jesus from his infancy through his being thirty years old. These missing years in the story become – for me, at least – a mirror where I can ask what happens: Why is Jesus ignored or missing so much of the time? What would it mean if he were with me, with us, all the time, not just re-entering with a thud after long lapses? Or, in fact, is he here all along – growing and learning all along? Working and sharing all along? Serving and speaking al along?



If so, the possibility is to take the Little Boy, Jesus, by the hand. If so, the challenge is long debates with the Teenager at the dining room table long after the food is finished. If so, the question is how we work alongside him, and discover him along our paths. Let us renew our own prayers to remain in the company of Jesus, to be released from our unfaith to seek the kingdom of his Peace. As we say such prayers, I offer this picture of one man in whom I have seen Jesus this week – here is NJ Congressman Andy Kim helping clean the Capitol Rotunda floor. The Peace of Christ be with you all.

- 1 Ascribe to the LORD, you gods, *ascribe to the LORD glory and strength.
- 2 Ascribe to the LORD the glory due his Name; *worship the LORD in the beauty of holiness.
- 3 The voice of the LORD is upon the waters; the God of glory thunders; * the LORD is upon the mighty waters.
- 4 The voice of the LORD is a powerful voice; *the voice of the LORD is a voice of splendor.

- 11 The LORD shall give strength to his people; *he LORD shall give the blessing of peace.


Acts 19:1-7

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the interior regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?" They replied, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit." Then he said, "Into what then were you baptized?" They answered, "Into John's baptism." Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied— altogether there were about twelve of them.

The Gospel – Mark 1:4-11

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."
