For Consideration – From The Indigenous NH Collaborative Collective (indigenousnh.com) – Land Acknowledgement
This land recognition statement is created by the Indigenous NH Collaborative Collective in consultation with local Tribal leaders and Indigenous peoples elsewhere. It is dynamic and may change depending on the changing goals of the Collective. At this time, we fight the invisibility of Indigenous peoples in the state of NH and call on you to join us in adopting this statement or one that reflects local Indigenous peoples', past and present, lasting connection to and stewardship of the land and waterways in what we now refer to as the state of NH. Since we aim to participate in lifting up local Indigenous cultural heritage, we adopt some Abenaki (a dialect of the Algonquian language family) terms in the statement. This is a current proposed version: "This talk/event/performance/etc. takes place on (or this library/school/theater/etc. is located on) N'dakinna, which is the traditional ancestral homeland of the Abenaki, Pennacook and Wabanaki Peoples past and present. We acknowledge and honor with gratitude the land and waterways and the alnobak (people) who have stewarded N'dakinna throughout the generations."
