The Collect for Purity – <u>Unison</u> – Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Collect of the Day: Almighty God, you alone can bring into order the unruly wills and affections of sinners: Grant your people grace to love what you command and desire what you promise; that, among the swift and varied changes of the world, our hearts may surely there be fixed where true joys are to be found; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

A Scripture Reading – Isaiah 43:16-21

Thus says the Lord, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick: Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. The wild animals will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise.

A Gospel Reading - John 12:1-8

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, "Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?" (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, "Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me." Homily – Wait, what did Jesus just say?

Our Thank Offering - Prayers of Gratitude and Intercession may be offered - A donation is not required.

The Eucharistic Minister leads the Prayers of the People (Adapted: Hymn #102, Once in royal David's City)
Once in royal David's city, stood a lowly cattle shed: Remind us, Lord, that you visit humble places and dwell among lowly people. Let us know and love you in those who are thirsty, hungry, imprisoned, sick and lonely.
He came down to earth from heaven, who is God and Lord of all: Each person and every creature matters and belongs. Inspire us to care for all the earth and all its inhabitants.

And his shelter was a stable, and his cradle was a stall: Many people have no home, many children find no cradle. Inspire our hearts and show us how to help here at home and in response to refugees everywhere. With the poor and mean and lowly, lived on earth our Savior holy: Guide us to turn to your grace and dignity when we forget how to greet those we think are beneath us, for then we, too, will find our Savior. And our eyes at last shall see him, through his own redeeming love: Tend the sick, Lord Christ; give rest to the weary; soothe the dying; shield the joyous – and all for your love's sake. (Please offer your prayers aloud or in the quiet of your hearts.)

And he leads his children on, to the place where he is gone: Bless us with the presence and gifts of your Holy Spirit so we may walk in your paths and sow the seeds of your glory, until we are all gathered in that heavenly place where you wipe away the tears from every eye.

Celebrant: Walk in love as Christ loved us, and gave himself for us, an offering and sacrifice to God.

Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Recalling Christ's suffering and death, and celebrating his resurrection and ascension, we await his coming in glory. Accept, O Lord, our sacrifice of praise, this remembrance of your unfailing love.

Send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts. Let them be for us the Body and Blood of your Son. And grant that we who eat this bread and drink this cup may be filled with your life and goodness.

We pray that all may receive the benefits of Christ's work, and the renewal of the Holy Spirit.

Open our eyes to see your hand at work in the world about us. Deliver us from the presumption of coming to this Table for solace only, and not for strength; for pardon only, and not for renewal. Let the grace of this Holy Communion make us one body, one spirit in Christ, that we may worthily serve the world in his name.

May Christ who has dinner with his friends be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.

Accept these prayers and praises, Father, through Jesus Christ our great High Priest, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, your Church gives honor, glory, and worship, from generation to generation. AMEN.

Celebrating Women - Did you know?

As a small girl, Cecil Frances Humphries (b. Redcross, County Wicklow, Ireland, 1818; Londonderry, Ireland, 1895) wrote poetry in her school's journal. In 1850 she married Rev. William Alexander, who later became the Anglican primate (chief bishop) of Ireland. She showed her concern for disadvantaged people by traveling many miles each day to visit the sick and the poor, providing food, warm clothes, and medical supplies. She and her sister also founded a school for the deaf. Alexander was strongly influenced by the Oxford Movement and by John Keble's Christian Year. Her first book of poetry, Verses for Seasons, was a "Christian Year" for children. She wrote hymns based on the Apostles' Creed, baptism, the Lord's Supper, the Ten Commandments, and prayer, writing in simple language for children. Her more than four hundred hymn texts – including All things bright and beautiful (see our sunflower on the first page) and Once in royal David's city (see our prayers today).
